ARTstART Gets Creative to Offer Online Art Learning

hat a year it was! Project ARTstART met its mission of engaging young students in learning about and making art while empowering secondary students to act as planners, presenters, and community leaders/role-models. Limited to remote learning, we focused on developing students' virtual presentation skills, with an emphasis on creating compelling content. In September, we welcomed 16 new ARTstARTers to our program, who gave us a total of 46 high school members for the year - an incredible feat, given that no in-person recruiting was permitted.

Operating during a pandemic, 'success' seemed elusive. No in-person museum visits or sessions. No AfterARTs drop-in workshops at school sites and in-person art making lessons were possible. Despite these obstacles, ARTstARTers came together on Zoom for weekly Friday sessions, learned about contemporary artists, and created lessons that could be made by students remotely during and after-school hours.

Online teaching forced innovation and opened new opportunities for ARTstART to reach more students at once, and 'travel' virtually to see many museums from New York and North Carolina to Los Angeles County. They teamed up to create nine prerecorded lessons of simple do-at-home art projects based on exhibitions that could be made by elementary students. You can find these videos on the Claremont Museum of Art YouTube channel.

In February, ARTstARTers formed 'live' teaching teams, and developed art lessons based on museum exhibitions around the world featured on Google Arts. Since March, ARTstARTers taught another 14 'live' art lessons on Zoom, often to entire grade levels



From late March through June, ARTstART lessons boasted a remote attendance of over 1,250 students. We were successful at transforming our program to an online community for artmaking, art appreciation, and the dissemination of art-making practices by and for our students.

ARTstART Has Staying Power

During the past year, the SOURCE group of Claremont McKenna College student consultants created an impact survey that they shared widely with Project ARTstART alumni. Of the many who responded, we learned that...

90.7% are pursuing or have completed a bachelor's degree or higher educational attainment

90% report ARTstART helped them feel confident to collaborate, lead a team and develop projects from start to finish

85.5% believe that ARTstART made them a more creative thinker across disciplines

CMA continues to support Project ARTstART to impact not just today's students, but tomorrow's cultural consumers and creatives.

for each school. Throughout the year, we offered our AfterARTs series of drop-in art lessons for students after school.

To conclude the year, we met in person at CMA and the Benton Museum of Art at Pomona College where, under COVID-19 safe procedures, ARTstARTers live-streamed from *Inside Out* and *Alison Saar: Of Aether and Earthe* exhibitions to their remotelearning peers. This summer, an ARTstART curatorial team under Project Assistant and Scripps Design Major Samantha Quach '23 is reviewing digital files of completed student art work and arranging them on a virtual 'bulletin board.'

The program is funded by generous donations from the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors through the Los Angeles County Department of Arts and Culture; Claremont Lincoln University; Kiwanis Club of Claremont Foundation; Scripps Fine Arts Foundation; the Rotary Club of Claremont, as well as CMA Board members and many dedicated community donors.
